Explore the qualities of relationships including friendship	
Investigate local and global scenarios where human rights have been seriously infringed, for example, child labour	
Investigate key human rights principles, for example, The United Nations Conventions of the Rights of Children (UNCRC) as a value base	
Investigate various ways to participate in school and society, for example, volunteering and community action/involvement	
Investigate an issue from a range of viewpoints and suggest action that might be taken to improve or resolve the situation, for example, involvement in campaigns on global issues

Discuss places and situations where the rights of children around the world have been violated
